Ventura Police Department Reminds Drivers & Passengers to Wear a Seat Belt

This Thanksgiving, the Ventura Police Department is joining the California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) to remind people how important it is to wear a seat belt, and the potentially deadly consequences of not buckling up.

Thanksgiving is one of the busiest travel times of the year. According to AAA, 48.5 million people will hit the road for the Thanksgiving holiday, making it more critical than ever for drivers and passengers to wear a seat belt. With more cars on the road, the chances of being involved in a crash go up, and a seat belt is the best defense.

It is why during the Thanksgiving holiday, which runs from Nov. 22-26, the Ventura Police Department will be looking for drivers and passengers who are not wearing a seat belt. As a <u>primary seat belt law</u> state, California law enforcement can issue tickets to people who fail to wear a seat belt. Violations are punishable by a \$162 <u>fine</u>.

"Wearing a seat belt can literally be a life-saver," said Commander Rick Murray "It only takes a couple seconds to buckle up and buckling up is the single most effective thing you can do to protect yourself in a crash."

The Ventura Police Department is one of many agencies across the country participating in the national *Click It or Ticket* enforcement campaign aimed at saving lives by making sure all drivers and passengers get the message to buckle up.

During the 2016 Thanksgiving weekend, 341 people were killed in crashes nationwide. Of those killed, 49 percent were not wearing a seat belt.

"Every day, we see the devastating effects of crashes involving people who don't wear a seat belt," said Traffic Sergeant Michael Brown. "Whether you're on a cross-country road trip or driving one block, it's critical you buckle up every trip, every time."

Funding for this seat belt enforcement operation is provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.
